"Undesirable" Wheat Varieties To Be Docked

WASHINGTON — The agriculture department announced Friday that wheat of 23 designated "undesirable" varieties, grown next year, will be docked 20 cents a bushel under the grower price support program.

Next year's crop will be supported at a national average of not less than \$1.81 a bushel.

11 Fatalities Across West At Weekend

(By The Canadian Press)
Eleven fatal accidents were reported in western Canada during the weekend, five of them in Manitoba. British Columbia reported three fatalities and Alberta three.

In Alberta, Dale VanGroen, 15, was drowned Friday in a dugout near Gadsby. The body was recovered Saturday. Donnie Semkin, 7, was accidentally shot by an older boy Saturday at Smoky Lake.

At least 21 persons were killed this weekend, a Canadian Press compilation shows. Seven perished as a result of a fire and a triple drowning.

At least eight persons met death through traffic accidents, seven were drowned, while six died from various other causes.

More than 3,000 Senior Citizens Receive Scrolls

EDMONTON — (CP) — Over 3,000 "senior citizen" scrolls have been issued to persons who have been residents of the province since 1905.

The 17-by-22 inch awards include the gold seal of the provincial secretary's department and are signed by Premier Manning and provincial Secretary Hooke.

Seek Two Men For Kidnapping, Beating B.C. Girl

VANCOUVER — (CP) — Police are seeking two men, described as foreign-speaking, in connection with the brutal kidnapping, beating, robbery and attempted rape of a 16-year-old girl.

The girl told investigating officers Saturday that she was kidnapped Friday by the two men about midnight and was held in a room in a downtown Vancouver.

The near-hysterical girl told police the men drove up in a late-model car, dragged her inside and sped away into the west end.

The girl was taken to St. Paul's hospital, where she was treated for shock and then allowed to go home.

Sinn Fein Wins Jailed Nationalist MP Wins North Ireland Seat Again

OMAGH, Northern Ireland — (Reuters)—A jailed bricklayer, pledged to unify Ireland by force if necessary, again was elected to the British Parliament — though he already has been disqualified from taking his seat.

The result of the by-election in mid-Ulster, gave Thomas Mitchell, a Sinn Fein (extreme nationalist) a majority of 806 votes over his Ulster Unionist (conservative) opponent.

The 24-year-old Mitchell, now serving a 10-year sentence for taking part in an armed raid on a British Army barracks here last October, polled 30,392 votes and Charles Beattie 29,586.

In the May 26 general election Mitchell had a majority of only 260, polling 29,737 to Beattie's 29,477.

The new election was called after the House of Commons in London resolved that Mitchell was disqualified from taking his seat because he is serving a prison sentence.

One-Time Nazi Spy Is Deported

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Erich Gimpel, one-time Nazi spy imprisoned after he sneaked into this country from a submarine in the Second World War, was deported Friday to his native Germany.

The justice department disclosed the forced departure in a terse announcement after Gimpel had been transferred from the Atlanta, Ga., federal prison to New York City.

Gimpel, now 46, was paroled from prison for deportation. Gimpel and American-born William Colepaugh were convicted on espionage charges at Governor's Island, N.Y.

The court sentenced both to death, but the White House commuted the sentences to life imprisonment. Colepaugh, now 37, was subsequently given a further commutation to 30 years. He is still in Leavenworth federal prison.

The two spies were caught by FBI agents in New York City a month after they landed by rubber boat launched from a German submarine at Frenchman Bay, Me.

Equipped with \$80,000 in cash, automatic pistols and invisible ink, they were put aboard the submarine at Kiel, Germany, in late 1944. They made their way ashore on Nov. 29 of that year.

Fight Looming Over Drug Cure Plan in B.C. Prison

VANCOUVER — (CP) — The Sun says a fight is looming between Attorney-General Robert Bonner and Oakalla prison farm warden Hugh Christie over implementation of a drug cure program.

The attorney-general announced last week the new treatment would be on a limited scale for selected inmates of the prison and would start "immediately."
