

Handy Travel Gadgets Eases Suitcase Living

Drip-dry fabrics mean that today's traveller need to pack fewer clothes. But now she must be prepared for hotel-room laundering.

That's why manufacturers are producing laundry aids especially designed to be tucked into a corner of a suitcase.

For instance, there's an elastic clothes line that hooks onto door knobs, nails or any handy hook. Clothes pins aren't necessary with this line for the twisted ropes separate to grip the clothes. Collapsible plastic clothes hangers avoid danger of hanger rust or stain when dresses, blouses and shirts are being drip-dried. And small envelopes of detergent come in handy for rinsing out clothes in a hotel bathroom.

Since so many people are on the move, a great deal of thought has been given to travel accessories. Now on the market are tubes of toilet soap which double as shampoo for the hair. And for freshening-up where soap and water aren't available, manufacturers have introduced packages of moist towelettes. This novelty water, soap or towel.

Though not a new item, polythene bags are still indispensable to the traveller. They keep shoes from soiling clothes and make a neater job of packing. A few extra bags in various sizes will invariably come in handy for wet face cloths, bathing suits or for keeping soiled laundry separate from clean clothes.

Already tried and proven for travelling are polythene cosmetic bottles. Because they are unbreakable, there's no fear of spilling make-up or lotion and they

weigh next to nothing. However, perfume doesn't travel well in polythene so it's advisable to take along some stick colognes.

A polythene soap dish is just the thing for carrying jewelry. Being soft it doesn't mark the jewelry and takes up little space in a crowded suitcase.

The wise traveller takes along an emergency sewing kit. Pins, needles and thread all together in a plastic bag can be packed inside a shoe.

It's easy to live out of a suitcase these days. A trip to the local department store will turn up dozens of handy travelling gadgets.

Verdict Coming On Ellis Hearing

OKOTOKS, Alta. (CP) — Judge Hugh Farthing said Friday he will reserve decision into the dismissal of John H. Ellis, Okotoks high school principal, by trustees.

Judge Farthing said his verdict on the board of reference hearing into reports of lack of discipline and poor scholastic achievement at the school will be forwarded to Hon. A. O. Aalborg, Alberta Education Minister.

Mr. Ellis, speaking in his own defence Friday in the fourth day of the hearing, said teachers in his school were always complaining but seldom had real complaints naming guilty students.

In rebuttal, Mrs. Patricia Palmer said she and other teachers brought names of offenders to Mr. Ellis many times.

In a memo to teachers produced as an exhibit, Mr. Ellis wrote that he had never said that there was a discipline problem and that some teachers had carried on a "well-organized campaign" to have him dismissed.

Reports made by L. W. Cornelius, high school inspector, were presented to the board of reference indicating the inspector's satisfaction with Mr. Ellis' work.

The report used such expressions as "very good leadership," discipline "under careful surveillance of Mr. Ellis," and "firm but friendly" when speaking of the principal.

The inspector had written that it was "impossible" to do justice to the duties of teaching administration and supervision demanded of the principal in that school.

C. M. Laverty, superintendent of schools for the Poothills division, testified in extensive detail concerning administration in Okotoks. The request of John Dea, counsel for Mr. Ellis, that Mr. Laverty be accepted as an "expert witness" was refused by the court on the basis of his involvement with the case.

Watkins Lauds R. B. Bennett

FREDERICTON (CP) — The late R. B. Bennett was the "second greatest Canadian politician of the 20th century," and "has always been deliberately obscured by the Liberals," his biographer said Thursday.

Ernest Watkins of Calgary, a Conservative member of the Alberta legislature, is here gathering material for his biography of the late Conservative prime minister who died 10 years ago.

Mr. Watkins says he ranks Bennett, prime minister from 1930 to 1935, next to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in political stature.

Bennett had developed an economic recovery program comparable to Franklin D. Roosevelt's in the United States and "far better than Mackenzie King ever produced."

WHY ARE THERE SO MANY DIFFERENT CHURCHES TODAY?

This is a natural question growing out of the realization that confusion and friction in religion do not have the sanction of God. It is inconceivable that men should be so divided when Christ died to reconcile our world "in one body by the cross" (Eph. 2:16). Several reasons may be given to explain the disparity in religious practice today among so many competing churches.

1. BECAUSE MEN HAVE INTRODUCED HUMAN INNOVATIONS. History gives us information concerning the approximate time when the religious movements began that led to the formation of present-day church-bodies. Both Catholicism and Protestantism have developed practices unknown to the New Testament.
2. BECAUSE MEN STOPPED SHORT IN THEIR SEARCH FOR TRUTH. Reformers such as Luther and Wesley and Zwingli led their followers into new understandings and insights. We honor their courage. We ought not to stop short, however, of Christ in our search for truth. He, alone, is "the way, the truth, and the life" (Jn. 14:6).
3. BECAUSE MEN HAVE MADE CREEDS OUT OF THEIR OPINIONS. Our search for truth cannot stop short of ALL TRUTH which is centered in Christ and revealed in the New Testament. Although human creeds contain some truths, yet the Word of God is able to furnish the man of God "unto all good works".
4. BECAUSE SOME ARE ATTRACTED TO THE BIZARRE, THE SPECTACULAR, OR THE UNUSUAL. For this reason, some people are attracted to cults.
5. BECAUSE MANY HAVE NOT ACCEPTED THE AUTHORITY OF CHRIST. We must seek the authority of Christ, submit in obedience to his will. We must restore the ancient society—Christ's church (1st Cor. 12:18).
