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Seven Mexican gunmen elude police manhunt

LOS MOCCHIS, Mexico (AP) — Gunmen eluded a huge police manhunt early today after fleeing his resort town with three hostages following a botched robbery and 24-hour siege in which five people were killed and 42 held captive.
All hostages were later freed.
Unconfirmed local reports said the robbers took about \$13,000 US in bank money. Carlos Cano, a policeman participating in the hunt, confirmed some money was taken but declined to say how much.
About 500 police and army personnel backed by a helicopter searched for the seven young men Thursday night and police set up blockades on highways leading out of the city.
"The gunmen must have gone to the

Sierra, where it will be difficult to locate them," said Cano, referring to the nearby Sierra Madre mountain range.
The gunmen had hiked up inside the local offices of the National Bank of Mexico after the foiled robbery. They let their 42 hostages go Thursday and were permitted to flee in an armored car with three Red Cross workers.
Police said the robbers released the Red Cross workers 15 minutes later, when they abandoned the armored car at a gas station and took off in a stolen pickup truck and station wagon.
One of the Red Cross workers, Rosario Angulo, said there were only five gunmen in the armored car, which he was forced to drive. Angulo said one of his captors had an arm wound.

Two sides in fishing dispute will continue their meetings

PARIS (CP) — Canadian and French negotiators have agreed to continue their meeting today on procedures for resuming talks on the fishing dispute between the countries.
Montreal lawyer Yves Fortier, head of the Canadian delegation, said Thursday on leaving a meeting at the Quai D'Orsay, the French Foreign Ministry, that the talks were useful.
He termed the atmosphere at the talks "non-glacial" — a reference to an editorial in Le Monde, a Paris newspaper which described relations between the countries as "glacial."
It was the third time the two sides have met in efforts to resume bargaining in the dispute over fishing quotas and zones around the two tiny French islands of St-Pierre-Miquelon, off the tip of Newfoundland.
The two sides met last month in London and then in New York but no agreement was reached on renewed negotiations.
In Ottawa, a Canadian official said the talks are centred on ways of sending the dispute over fish quotas for the French to an impartial mediator. The official cautioned that there is no thought of sending that aspect to arbitration.

be the only workable way to settle the limits of French control around the two islands.
Mediation is a process in which a third party works with both sides in a dispute to help them find ways of settling it themselves. In arbitration, a third party listens to the arguments and recommends a settlement.
Mediation is considered to be acceptable to Canada, arbitration to the quota question has been ruled out.
"Canada does not want a third party handling this process," said Bonnie Mewdell, a spokesman for the Canadian Fisheries Department.

Was that Jesse Jackson?
Was that Jesse Jackson riding by in the big black limousine, or was that him in the rented bus?
One play used by the U.S. Secret Service to throw off a potential assassination attempt of the Democratic presidential contender and black civil rights leader is a Jesse Jackson look-alike.
The decoy, Washington-based Secret Service agent Roberto Romero, has been a Jesse Jackson stand-in, on and off, for several years.
Romero would not be mistaken for Jackson in a face-to-face encounter, but he is about the same height and body build as the Democratic presidential contender.
"Once I got out of the car and the crowd started shouting, 'Jesse-see! Jesse-see! Jesse-see!'" he told Reuters.
All major presidential candidates are normally offered Secret Service protection beginning January 1 of the election year. Some like Democratic frontrunner Michael Dukakis, turn it down. Jackson, at his request, was granted protection two months ahead of schedule because of death threats.

Timothy Kesimaa, of Hamilton, Ont., the 37-day-old baby who received a new heart just two weeks ago, was to leave hospital in Loma Linda, Calif. today, said his mother Bonnie Hamilton.
Hospital officials say it is fastest recovery of any of the 15 babies who have received a heart transplant at the renowned hospital.
Timothy continues to recover without signs of rejecting the new heart he received in a transplant operation April 7, Hamilton said in a telephone interview late Thursday.

Queenin LeDoux had quite a 26th birthday.
He reunited with his wife, became a born-again Christian and, with the help of a fire extinguisher salesman, saved two men trapped in a burning car.
"It was the best birthday I've ever had," the furniture mover said Thursday night. "Saving the lives of two people after I was saved and having my wife behind me is just fantastic."
LeDoux said that earlier in the evening, he had reunited with his wife Laura and their two children after an 11-month separation.
New Westminster police confirmed that LeDoux's prompt action had rescued the trapped motorists who were in their early 20's. The two were released from hospital later that day after being treated for minor injuries.

Wage boost means jobs hard to find

VANCOUVER (CP) — Students can expect a harder time finding their first job under British Columbia's new \$4.50 minimum wage, an accommodation industry spokesman said Thursday.
Employers, particularly in the labor-intensive accommodation industry, will be less inclined to hire inexperienced people and that will hit students, said Gerry Williams, past president of the B.C. Motels and Resorts Association.
The new minimum wage, up 50 cents an hour, takes effect July 1.
"The new minimum wage is going to make us a little more choosy about who we hire," Williams said.
"Students won't be able to walk through the door and get a job. We will want to know more about their work habits."
Williams, whose Nanaimo motel-restaurant employs nine people, said he hires at the minimum wage and then pays more as the employee develops in the job.
Not all motels and resorts hire at minimum wage, said association president Jake Dyck, but for those that do, the timing of the increase — after prices have been set for the coming season — may be a burden.
"Any time an increase in costs comes in, it can present problems."
But Williams and Dyck both said the increase is justified.

Little progress on acid rain

TORONTO (CP) — A new Gallup poll commissioned by the Canadian Coalition on Acid Rain suggests Canadians want Prime Minister Brian Mulroney to get tougher with the United States on the acid rain issue.
The poll, released Thursday, says 71 per cent of respondents believe the Canadian government has made little or no progress in getting the U.S. government to reduce emissions causing acid rain.
Results also show 57 per cent of respondents feel the Canadian government isn't doing all it can to reach an agreement with the U.S. government to reduce emissions.
The poll, conducted in February through personal interviews with 1,049 adults across the country, is considered accurate plus or minus four per cent, 19 out of 20 times.
Michael Perley, the coalition's executive co-ordinator, said the results make it clear Mulroney must tell U.S. President Ronald Reagan at a meeting in Washington later this month that Canadians are "tired as hell and we're not going to make it anymore."
